The Society continues to be in good financial condition. Our policy of building and maintaining a reserve fund, which totaled \$36 million at Sept. 30, 2018, is a key factor in our positive financial condition. The reserve fund has been built primarily from earnings on our long-term investment fund, which earned \$3.35 million in 2018 from strong returns in the equity markets.

For fiscal 2018, the Society and its affiliates had unrestricted operating revenues of

\$57 million, unrestricted operating expenses of \$57.9 million, and a negative net from operations of \$900,000. Earnings on our investment portfolio and program contributions from the ASCE Foundation have helped compensate for the revenue shortfall.

The relationship between annual operating revenue and increasing expense is a key long-term issue that the Board of Direction is addressing to maintain our continued strong financial condition.




